Keynote Speaker

Janet Brown, Program Officer for Food Systems, Center for Ecoliteracy

Janet Brown is Program Officer for Food Systems at the Center for Ecoliteracy (CEL) in Berkley, California. She is also a certified organic farmer and vice president of Marin Organic, an association of nearly 40 organic producers in Marin County marketing their produce and products under their own local label. She is founder and chair of the Marin Food Policy Council. For four years, through the Center for Ecoliteracy, Janet facilitated a five-county network of innovative Farm to School projects in Northern California. Its struggles and accomplishments are synthesized in a CEL Web guide, *Rethinking School Lunch*, for which Janet was the principle author. She is also the content editor for a monthly CEL essay series by noted authors entitled, *Thinking Outside the Lunch Box*. Furthermore, she compiled and wrote the Model Wellness Policy Guide for schools, a collaboration of the Center for Ecoliteracy, Slow Food USA and the Chez Panisse Foundation.

Rethinking School Lunch

Rethinking School Lunch (RSL) is an online guide and business-planning framework for implementing an innovative vision: school lunch as part of an integrated curriculum. This curriculum addresses the crisis in childhood obesity and restores the connection of farms to communities, meals to culture, and health to our children and the environment. Rethinking School Lunch was developed by the Center for Ecoliteracy from its decade of experience working with exemplary school programs that connect children to the natural world. This presentation will offer an overview of the RSL approach to linking classroom studies with hands-on experiences in school gardens, kitchen classrooms and cafeterias. RSL makes nutrition education and well being part of the educational system.

Case Studies: Burnstein Hall

Large and Small Scale: Maximizing School Gardens

Anna D. Viertel, Chicago Botanic Garden, Instructor for Junior Green Youth Farm at McCorkle School

This session will address the process of adapting a large-scale urban farm model to a much smaller school landscape. Anna will demonstrate techniques for maximizing space such as intensive planting, crop stations, and vertical beds in order to prove how productive a small space can be. Program decisions and problem solving that allowed the Chicago Botanic Garden to transform a small irregular space into a vibrant school garden will be discussed.

St. Monica's Environmental Academy

Father Ted Schmitt, St. Monica's Parish, Chicago

Father Ted Schmitt will be the first to tell you that he's an unlikely spokesman for the environmental movement. And yet, within the Chicago Archdiocese, he is one of the most vocal of his brethren on the subject of saving God's good earth. He's found a way to do this through educating the earth's youngest citizens. Hear about Father Ted's conversion to green and the exciting partnership between his parish school and the Chicago Botanic Garden, which brings an ecologically creative and fresh new approach to education.

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Rain Gardening: Teaching Infiltration to the Next Generation: Fairchild Room

Elaine Grehl, LEAP Fellow and PhD student at the University of Illinois at Chicago

This session will explore the benefits of rain gardens on water quality, air quality, biodiversity, and overall quality of life. Instruction will be provided for easy-to-do design and installation projects. Possible funding opportunities and materials resources will also be addressed.

Start Your Own Farm to Table Program: Burnstein Hall

Prairie Crossing Charter School's award-winning Farm to Table lunch program is a collaboration among parents, staff and the Prairie Crossing Learning Farm. The Learning Farm works with the school's students in grades K-8 to integrate class lessons with growing fresh, seasonal produce for a monthly all-school lunch, prepared by parents and featuring student presentations about the crops they grew. Learn how the program was created; gain insights into logistics; explore crop choice and scale, menu planning and lesson presentations; taste a sample entrée; and take home a sample calendar of lessons and menus.

Rethinking School Lunch Curriculum: Alsdorf Auditorium

Janet Brown, Keynote Speaker, Center for Ecoliteracy in Berkeley, California

Join Janet to learn how you can use the food system as an integrator across the curriculum. Explore how links to experiences in instructional gardens, kitchen classrooms, farm field studies and the lunch room connect to the academic classroom and formal curriculum. This interactive session, based on the Center for Ecoliteracy's Rethinking School Lunch program, will inspire you to go back to your school and use the garden as an outdoor interdisciplinary laboratory.

"Green Cleaners": Fairchild Room

Claris Olson, Healthy Schools Campaign

Research shows a clear link between poor indoor air quality, sick students, and poor academic and occupational performance. Furthermore, children miss more than 14 million school days each year due to asthma exacerbated by poor indoor air quality, which disproportionately affects low-income and minority students. A well-designed "green cleaning "program can help reduce these harmful exposures and yield many other positive benefits for students, custodial staff, administrators and the environment.
