## Professional Certificate Program



### The Chicago Botanic Garden invites you to the eighth annual Healthcare Garden Design Professional Development Certificate Program.

From May 5 through May 12, 2010, attendees at the Healthcare Garden Design Certificate Program will discover the many ways gardens provide verifiable health benefits for their patients, clients, staff, and visitors.

Often referred to as therapeutic landscapes, healing spaces, or restorative gardens, healthcare gardens are proven to possess restorative powers. In a healthcare environment, gardens provide a sense of order, safety, and privacy for those coping with illness.

The multidisciplinary program will introduce attendees to the latest research demonstrating the benefits of healthcare gardens, while providing participants with the expertise, knowledge, and tools to effectively design, manage, and evaluate such gardens.

### Eight-day Program

The eight-day program begins with a special full-day seminar, "Gardens That Heal: A Prescription for Wellness," designed as a starting point for those participating in the full program and as an introduction for professionals not requiring full certification.

The day-one agenda includes special presentations by Roger Ulrich, Clare Cooper Marcus, Teresia Hazen, and Jack Carman designed to energize your organization's healthcare garden design program.

## Industry-leading Instructors

The Chicago Botanic Garden's Joseph Regenstein, Jr. School of the Chicago Botanic Garden has brought together some of the nation's most renowned experts in the field of healthcare garden design and research.

**Roger Ulrich, Ph.D.**, professor, departments of architecture and landscape architecture and urban planning, Texas A&M University, and director, Center for Health Systems & Design, Texas A&M University. Behavioral scientist who teaches courses in the area of evidence-based design and researches the effects of healthcare facilities and nature on medical outcomes. Published widely and internationally renowned in the area of evidence-based healthcare design.

**Clare Cooper Marcus**, professor emerita, departments of architecture and landscape architecture, University of California, and principal of Healing Landscapes in Berkeley, California. Internationally recognized for pioneering research on the psychological and sociological aspects of architecture and landscape design, particularly urban open space.

**Teresia M. Hazen**, MEd, HTR, QMHP, registered horticultural therapist and coordinator of therapeutic gardens and horticultural therapy, Legacy Health Systems, Portland, Oregon. Directs Legacy Health System's horticultural therapy department in Portland, overseeing multiple therapeutic gardens (three have received the American Horticultural Therapy Association's Therapeutic Garden Design Award).

**Jack Carman**, FASLA, president, Design for Generations, Medford, New Jersey. Specializes in creating therapeutic exterior environments for senior communities and healthcare facilities, including more than 80 landscape plans for assisted living and Alzheimer residences, adult day healthcare centers, long-term care facilities, and continuing care retirement communities and community hospitals in more than 12 states.

**Joanne M. Westphal**, ASLA, AMA, AOA, professor, landscape architecture program, Michigan State University. Landscape architect and licensed practicing physician in Michigan; specialties include therapeutic site design, health in the built environment, and the medical underpinnings of LEED.

**Mark Epstein**, ASLA, senior landscape architect, ESA Adolfsen, Seattle, Washington. Project manager or project landscape architect on hundreds of professional projects for more than 15 years. Has served as co-chair of the Therapeutic Garden Design Professional Practice Network for the American Society of Landscape Architects. Teaches therapeutic site design for hospitals and healthcare settings at the University of Washington and at the Chicago Botanic Garden.

**Robert Hoover**, ASLA, principal of HBLA, Inc., Portsmouth, New Hampshire. Specializes in healthcare, senior living, and residential projects, with HBLA designing more than 100 healthcare-related projects throughout the Northeast. Earned his B.S. in environmental design from the University of Massachusetts and his master's degree in landscape architecture from Harvard University's Graduate School of Design.

**Marni Barnes**, ASLA, MSW, principal of Deva Designs, Palo Alto, California. Consults and creates therapeutic landscapes in public and private settings, drawing upon ten years' experience as a psychotherapist and social worker practicing in the United States and Great Britain, as well as more than 25 years as a landscape designer.

**Nancy Chambers**, director of Glass Garden, Rusk Institute of Rehabilitation Medicine, New York, New York. Registered horticultural therapist and director of the Glass Garden at NYU Medical Center's Rusk Institute since 1986. Committed to innovative and high-quality programming; writes, lectures, teaches, and consults in the U.S. and abroad, and has received numerous distinguished honors for her work.

**Robin Moore**, MCP, professor of landscape architecture and director of the natural learning initiative, School of Design, North Carolina State University. International authority on the design of children's play and learning environments, user-needs research, and participatory public open space design. As director of the initiative he is involved in the design and renovation of dozens of outdoor spaces for preschools, special education facilities, and school grounds in North Carolina.

**Gwenn Fried**, Glass Garden, Rusk Institute of Rehabilitation Medicine, New York, New York. Horticultural therapist at the Glass Garden since 1997 and curator of the Rusk outdoor gardens. Focuses on the anthropological uses of plants through history and weaves these lessons into classes for seniors and children. Formerly the director of the Children's Garden at Rutgers Gardens.

**Geoffrey Roehll**, ASLA, senior vice president of healthcare design team, Hitchcock Design Group, Naperville, Illinois. Since joining Hitchcock in 1990 has demonstrated leadership, planning, and design skills on prominent projects in Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, North Carolina, and Florida and has directed many landmark projects in the healthcare market. Now focused exclusively on healing environments and evidence-based design.
