The Chicago Botanic Garden invites you to the ninth annual Healthcare Garden Design Professional Development Certificate Program.

From May 4 through 11, 2011, attendees at the Healthcare Garden Design Certificate Program will discover the many ways gardens provide verifiable health benefits for their patients, clients, staff, and visitors.

Often referred to as therapeutic landscapes, healing spaces, or restorative gardens, healthcare gardens are proven to possess restorative powers. In a healthcare environment, gardens provide a sense of order, safety, and privacy for those coping with illness.

The multidisciplinary program will introduce attendees to the latest research demonstrating the benefits of healthcare gardens, while providing participants with the expertise, knowledge, and tools to effectively design, manage, and evaluate such gardens.

Eight-day Program

The eight-day program begins with a special full-day seminar, entitled Gardens That Heal: A Prescription for Wellness, which is designed as a starting point for those participating in the full program and an introduction for professionals not requiring full certification.

The day-one agenda includes special presentations by Roger Ulrich, Clare Cooper Marcus, Teresia Hazen, and Jack Carman, which is designed to energize your organization's healthcare garden design program.

Industry-leading Instructors

The Chicago Botanic Garden's Joseph Regenstein, Jr. School of the Chicago Botanic Garden has brought together some of the nation's most renowned experts in the field of healthcare garden design and research.

Roger Ulrich, Ph.D., professor, departments of architecture and landscape architecture and urban planning, Texas A&M University, and director, Center for Health Systems & Design, Texas A&M University. Behavioral scientist who teaches evidence-based design, and conducts research on the effects of healthcare facilities and nature on medical outcomes. Published widely and internationally renowned in the area of evidence-based healthcare design.

Clare Cooper Marcus, professor emerita, departments of architecture and landscape architecture, University of California, and principal of Healing Landscapes, Berkley, California. Internationally recognized for pioneering research on the psychological and sociological aspects of architecture and landscape design.

Teresia M. Hazen, MEd, HTR, QMHP, coordinator of therapeutic gardens and horticultural therapy, Legacy Health, Portland, Oregon. Directs Legacy's horticultural therapy department, overseeing multiple therapeutic gardens (three have received the American Horticultural Therapy Association's Therapeutic Garden Design Award).

Jack Carman, FASLA, president, Design for Generations, Medford, New Jersey. Specializes in creating therapeutic exterior environments for senior communities and healthcare facilities, including assisted living and Alzheimer residences, long-term care facilities, and continuing care retirement communities and community hospitals in more than 12 states.

Joanne M. Westphal, ASLA, AMA, AOA, professor, landscape architecture program, Michigan State University. Landscape architect and licensed practicing physician in Michigan; specialties include therapeutic site design, health in the built environment, and the medical underpinnings of LEED.

Mark Epstein, ASLA, senior landscape architect, ESA Adolfson, Seattle, Washington. Served as co-chair of the Therapeutic Garden Design Professional Practice Network for the American Society of Landscape Architects. Teaches therapeutic site design at the University of Washington.

Robert Hoover, ASLA, principal of HBLA, Inc., Portsmouth, NH. Specializes in healthcare, senior living, and residential projects, with HBLA designing more than 100 healthcare-related projects throughout the Northeast.

Marni Barnes, ASLA, MSW, principal of Deva Designs, Palo Alto, California. Consults and creates therapeutic landscapes in public and private settings, drawing upon ten years' experience as a psychotherapist and social worker, as well as more than 25 years as a landscape designer.

Nancy Chambers, HTR, director of Glass Garden, Rusk Institute of Rehabilitation Medicine, New York, NY, since 1986. The many facets of the Glass Garden's programs, including the award-winning Rusk Children's Play Garden, reflect her commitment to innovative and high-quality programming.

Nilda Cosco, Ph.D., education specialist and research associate professor, College of Design, and co-founder, Natural Learning Initiative, North Carolina State University. Primary research interest is the impact of outdoor environments on child and family health outcomes, particularly as they relate to natural components of the built environment.

Gwenn Fried, Glass Garden, Rusk Institute of Rehabilitation Medicine, New York, NY. Horticultural therapist at the Glass Garden since 1997 and curator of the Rusk outdoor gardens. Focuses on the anthropological uses of plants and weaves these lessons into classes for seniors and children. Formerly the director of the Children's Garden at Rutgers Gardens.

Geoffrey Roehll, ASLA, senior vice president, Healthcare Design Team, Hitchcock Design Group, Naperville, IL. Since joining Hitchcock Design group in 1990 has directed many landmark projects in the healthcare market. Now focused exclusively on healing environments and practices evidence-based design on each of their projects.

Eugene Rothert, HTR, director emeritus, Horticultural Therapy Services, Chicago Botanic Garden; past president of the American Horticultural Therapy Association. Active in the field of horticultural therapy for more than 25 years. Responsible for developing and implementing the Garden's horticultural therapy program.

William Sullivan, Ph.D., professor, department of landscape architecture, University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, and president of the Council of Environmental Deans and Directors. Focuses on issues related to environmental sustainability and the role of public institutions in creating a sustainable world.
